

## Ottawa-Gatineau to Host National Worker Co-op Conference this fall By Kenzie Love, Federation Executive Assistant

OTTAWA, ON. – The <u>Canadian Worker Co-operative Federation</u> (the "Federation") has announced plans to host its 26th annual fall conference in Ottawa-Gatineau from November 2-4, together with co-hosts <u>CoopZone</u> and Quebec's Worker Co-operation Network, <u>le Réseau</u>.

The three-day Conference, which brings together many of the Federation's 55 member organizations and 100+ indirect members from across the country, aims to strengthen Canada's growing worker co-operative sector. It features a number of workshops, networking sessions, and guest speakers. This year's keynote speakers are Senators <u>Lucie Moncion</u>, former President of Co-operatives and Mutuals Canada, and <u>Murray Sinclair</u>, former Chief Commissioner of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission.

A worker co-op, for the uninitiated, is a form of business where a company's employees own and democratically manage the business. They share in both the business' decision-making and its profit. Currently, there are an estimated 350 worker co-ops across Canada, employing 10,000 people. The Ottawa-Gatineau region is home to a number of worker co-operatives including Brierwood Apps, Coloc Studio Créatif, and La Siembra (Camino Chocolates).

The conference theme is "Radical Roots/Radical Routes of Worker Co-operation", which will explore the radical history of worker co-ops and how this translates into a vision for a future of radical inclusivity.

While conference sessions will key in on this theme, there will also be workshops on financial management and human resources in a worker co-operative, as well as government relations and business strategy and more.

Executive Director Hazel Corcoran said, "I'm excited that the Federation is hosting its Conference on the border between Quebec and Ontario, a region with many worker co-operatives, and about the theme of *Radical Routes*. What this means to me is that instead of capital hiring labour with increasing inequality and a growing "precariat", the worker co-op

movement has people hiring capital. The sessions at this Conference – notably but not only the Worker Co-op Management Intensive -- will help worker co-ops function more effectively."
