Introduction

CWCF Beginnings

CWCF was federally incorporated under the Canada Co-operative Association Act on December 2nd, 1992.

According to the articles of incorporation, CWCF was formed as a non-profit organization to work for the development and expansion of business organized to cooperative principles and the principles of worker ownership and control and to promote the ideas of democracy in the workplace. Also CWCF was to provide leadership and a voice for worker co-operatives.

CWCF, upon organizing, had five regions: Atlantic (NB, NS, PEI, NFLD), Quebec, Ontario, Prairies (Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta, and NWT), and BC (including Yukon). Directors were to be nominated regionally and ratified by CWCF at the AGM. They were elected for two-year terms.

Directors elected at the founding meeting in Antigonish in April, 1991: Cliff White (Atlantic), Bob Allen (Ontario), Nick Orton (Prairies) and Deb Foot (BC).

The history leading to the incorporation and the inaugural meeting April 17, 1991

Prior to the incorporation meeting the idea of a worker co-op federation evolved from the ideas of three worker co-op leaders. Bob Allen was at that time the financial manager of The Big Carrot, a Toronto worker co-op specializing in organic foods. Marty Frost was a general manager and worker owner of CRS Worker Co-op in Vancouver. Jack Quarter was the editor and publisher of Worker Co-op Magazine, a national publication produced quarterly. Allen, Frost and Quarter attended a meeting of NASCO (North American Students for Cooperation) in Ann Arbor, Michigan, Nov. 1989, where they together came to the conclusion that worker co-ops in Canada should have a federation to speak for them. Frost and Allen began work in late 1989 by proposing to the Co-op Secretariat that a national meeting be organized to determine if sufficient interest was there. Ken McCready of the Co-op Secretariat agreed to their request and it was Alain Roy who championed it for us and brought the Secretariat to the table in a big way. It (and he) has never left. Over the course of the first few years, the Secretariat was always there, they gave us contracts that funded us for the first few years, they supported the magazine, they've been great."

Frost says as he recalls the meeting came together in this way.

"I sort of drew in all the names on my contact list, as did Bob and Jack, we sort of bulk-mailed out notices. I'm not sure who else came in at this stage. CRS was very supportive of my doing this. We wanted to get in folks from the existing co-op sector, so invited Lynden Hillier, who was then executive director of CCA (which was at the time only three years old or so), the folks from the Secretariat, and pretty much everyone we could find an address for. We all put out all the feelers around worker co-ops that we'd even heard rumours about. I don't remember who was doing the contacts in the Maritimes, but we sure got great representation there." Frost says that the federation actually took shape at this meeting.

"I don't remember who all was involved in crafting the agenda, I'm guessing again that it was mostly the three of us. I also remember that we didn't really know how it would go. Our fear was that the folks there wouldn't see a need for a Federation, then what would we talk about for the rest of the time? The fear was unfounded. By noon of that first day, the group was electric! There was such positive energy for the idea. We workshopped out the creation of the mission statement, the vision, etc which was pretty much done by the end of the day. I think we met for a half-day on Sunday as well. I think that's where we presented the final wording for the vision and mission and it got adopted by the group. That's where we set up the interim steering committee (me, Peter, Huguette Girard, Jim Winter and Bob, I think, made up the steering committee) and set its terms of reference, task list, etc." at that meeting in 1990 in Ottawa where

20 people came together representing seven provinces. According to the registration records the following attended:

A steering committee was formed and the founding convention and 1st AGM was held in Antigonish, NS on April 5-7 at the Coady Institute. Seventy-five people attended. This was to create a structure that would with limited financial resources undertake in the next 10 years initiatives on behalf of its membership.

For a small organization CWCF has substantially impacted on the history of co-operatives in Canada during the last decade of the 20th century.

But the idea of a federation was discussed as early as 1980 by co-operative leaders involved in the the Future Directions Project.

In April, 1981, John Jordan authored a working paper "Developing Worker Co-operatives" as part of the Co-op Future Directions Project. In the opening he credited his interest in the subject from being a member of a worker co-op in 1971 and noted that ICA had recently (1980) endorsed them as a priority for development. Jordan was at that time adjunct assistant professor, Faculty of Environmental Studies, York University. Yet it took another 10 years for a Canadian federation to evolve.

Worker co-operatives were not a new idea. As far back as 1854 Rochdale Pioneers had started a cotton mill as a worker co-op. But the idea of worker co-op enterprise, perhaps ahead of its time changed and became more a "wholly owned subsidiary concept" during the next 30 years. In Canada after WWII, Quebec had notable worker co-op development. In Europe, strong worker co-op movements evolved in the 1950s in the Basque region in Spain and in the 1970's France and Italy had success with worker co-op development.

Jordan noted that in the 20th century "democracy has advanced least in the world of work. Yet work is a central experience of adults; much of our sense of identity springs from our work."

Jordan suggested in his concluding remarks: 1) a model be developed and legislation be made appropriate 2) a reliable access to funding be established 3) assured markets be established (government or other coops) to insure viability in the early stage. Today 20 years after Jordan's paper and 10 years after the formation of the CWCF, the first two of his suggestions have been realized.

Informal meeting while attending the Nasco (North American Students for Cooperation) Conference
In Ann Arbor, Michigan, November 1989

Marty Frost, general manager and worker owner of CRS Worker Co-op in Vancouver, B.C.; Bob Allen, financial manager of The Big Carrot, Toronto, Ontario; and Jack Quarter, editor and publisher of Worker Co-op Magazine came to the conclusion that worker co-ops in Canada should have a Federation to speak for them.

Later in 1989 Marty Frost and Bob Allen proposed to Ken McCready of the Co-ops Secretariat that a national meeting be organized to determine if sufficient interest was there, and they agreed and provided funding. Alain Roy championed our request to the Co-op Secretariat and brought the Secretariat to the table in a big way, and the Secretariat and Alain supported CWCF from then on.

An invitation went out to Lynden Hillier, executive director of CCA, the folks from the Secretariat and pretty much everyone we could find an address for.

Meeting in Ottawa, February 1990

The Federation actually took shape at this meeting Wording for the vision and mission were adopted by the group Marty Frost, Peter Hough, Huguette Girard, Jim Winter and Bob Allen made up the steering committee and set its terms of reference, task list, etc.



Historic Meeting CWCF/FQCT Joint Conference and AGMS 1994

Hazel Corcoran, Seán Hennessey and Jackie Somerville

The Canadian Worker Co-op Federation (CWCF) and The Quebec Worker Co-op Federation (FQCT) held a joint conference and annual general meetings in Montreal, December 2 -4, 1994. This was the first time the two federations had held a joint conference. The theme of the conference was "Member Services, Members Linkages: The Role of our Federations. The major direction coming out of the AGMs was an emphasis on new alliances. Multistakeholder and shareholder co-ops are now eligible for full membership in the CWCF. Another sentiment that was common was the emphasis on working together across the nation no matter what happens politically. The CWCF will continue to work on the federal level lobbying, encouraging more information sharing among worker co-ops and seeking resources for worker co-op development.

The CWCF is set up on a regional basis and two regions provided particularly interesting information. Quebec has 3,300 co-ops, including credit unions. Government support has been

important. John Brouwer provided an excellent summary of the Ontario Worker Co-op Federation's mission and work, which is advanced for the rest of Canada but still well behind that of Quebec. The conference included tours of worker co-ops in the Montreal area, including Harpell Printers, Scopcat, CACI Consultants and ACPAV Audio-visual. ACPAV has been operating for about 20 years. 
